

## Answers

Below is the corrected paragraph. The correct answers are shown in red. There is a guide in blue to where you can find more information about the grammar points in this paragraph. All information can either be found in the 'How to Use Verb Tenses in Business' book or from lessons in the Fluency Space Academy.

**Have you ever heard** (See 'How to Use Verb Tenses in Business' Lesson 3) of Irish wine? Ireland certainly isn't a traditional hotspot for fine wines, but vineyards **are starting** (See 'How to Use Verb Tenses in Business' Lesson 1) to spring up across the country. Due to climate change, the conditions for **growing grapes** (See 'Key Verb Patterns and General Patterns for Business' Lesson) are now fairly favourable in northern countries. The average temperature overall for Ireland **has increased** (See 'How to Use Verb Tenses in Business' Lesson 3) by 0.7 degrees Celsius, thus increasing the overall growing season from seven to 16 days.

**One of the country's longest-established wine producers** (See 'Key Verb Patterns and General Patterns for Business' Lesson) is David Llewellyn, who **has been growing** (See 'How to Use Verb Tenses in Business' Lesson 4) grapes for decades on his fruit farm less than half an hour north of Dublin: *"It started as a kind of side-hustle, but now it **is now becoming / has now become** (See 'How to Use Verb Tenses in Business' Lessons 1 and 3) a significant source of income. Nobody will ever retire rich from Irish wine, but I will never **stop producing** (See 'Key Verb Patterns and General Patterns for Business' Lesson) it because I have a real passion for the vines."*
